

Eyewitness to History: A Holocaust Survivor Speaks

Rudi Florian: Propaganda & Personal Responsibility



Born to devout Catholics in 1934 in Germany, Rudi Florian's parents opposed the Nazis but didn't dare do so openly. As a child, Rudi's teachers were Nazis and his schoolbooks contained Nazi propaganda. When he was 10 years old, he briefly served in the Hitler Youth until his mother came up with an excuse to have him released. When Russian troops invaded Germany, Rudi's family was displaced to Poland. Eventually, they moved to East Berlin, where Rudi encountered Communist propaganda.

Later in life, Rudi made a pledge to "join those who warned that genocide can happen again to any group of people, anywhere..." and served in the United States Air Force for 30 years. Now retired, Rudi educates others about the importance of remember the Holocaust, the value of human rights, and the sanctity of life.

How and why did ordinary people in Germany contribute to the persecution of their Jewish neighbors?

What role did propaganda play in the Holocaust? How and why did the Nazi Party target youth with propaganda?
